

Camera, Lights, Action at Bray Studios!



The Bray Studios sign on the A308 has moved recently and more temporary buildings have appeared, Rod Ball tells us why.

You may well be aware that there are 'live' planning permissions for residential housing on both the Bray Studios and Water Oakley sites, which are next door to each other. However, demand for studio space has increased dramatically of late.

There are many companies such as Netflix, Sky, Amazon and Disney in the market place, and the UK is a very attractive place for filming. This particularly applies to Bray Studios due to the proximity of Heathrow and rapid access to London, not to mention the attractive surroundings.

Bray Studios have come back to life in the last 18 months or so and productions including Kingsman, Rocket Man, Dracula and Mama Mia have all been filmed at Bray.

A large new TV production with world wide locations is due to start filming in Spring which is why planning permission has been applied for to enable temporary buildings to be erected and remain in place for two years including two stages, workshops, rehearsal space and production offices. Because of very short timescales building work has started on these temporary buildings but the applicant did advise and consult with RBWM, local community leaders and neighbours prior to starting work.

I met with the producers of the new TV series, who are committed to using local suppliers, and will offer work experience to local young people during the school holidays. Local suppliers for office equipment, accommodation, restaurants, taxis, cleaners etc will be required. I understand that already one local catering supplier has been taken on.

The owners of the site tell me that the planning permissions for residential dwellings remain in place. Top soil has been moved to accommodate the new temporary buildings and the intention is to keep this on site so it can be put back after the temporary buildings are removed. In the meantime it will be landscaped. There will be tree and shrub planting along the frontage to soften the views of the buildings and I am told that the existing ugly mound of earth seen from the road is to be removed.

In addition to the above extensive work is being carried out on the Grade II listed Down Place mansion, which includes underpinning, work to the roof and structure, and landscaping of the grounds including the riverside. The listed building is not included in the temporary planning application.

Local History: The Parish of Braywood

The village of Braywood is not strictly a village but a community made up of several parts which include Oakley Green, Fifield, Forest Green and Hans Hill. It was originally located in the province of Wessex.

When Christianity arrived in this area, Parishes were created and the Parish of Brai (now known as Bray, low lying land) was founded somewhere around 650AD and its Abbey was in Abingdon. Eventually this Province was divided into shires and by 860AD these shires were further divided into 'hundreds' or 12,000 acres approximately. The 'hundred' of Brai included Hawthorn Hill, Braywick, Moneyrow Green, Touchen End, Stud Green, Holyport, Water Oakley, Oakley Green and Fifield.

The first authentic mention of Braywood occurs in the Domesday Book, where it is noted that Bray had sufficient woods to feed 60 pigs on acorns and beech mash for a year. This area is largely the area now known as Braywood. The early history of Braywood is found in the records of Bray Parish, however the Parish of Braywood was not taken/created from the Parish of Bray until 1871.

Local areas were used by Drovers to graze their sheep and the village grew as it was located on the main pack horse route from Windsor to Reading and the Water Oakley Wharf belonged to the Queen and it was used to send the wood from Windsor Great Park to London via the River Thames. The tithing man of Water Oakley Wharf collected eight shillings in tolls from the 16 passing boats in 1333, considered quite a heavy toll!

The Manor of Bray was offered for sale just after the beheading of King Charles 1 (he owned the Manor) and it was stated that the Beadle of the Manor had the right to take four loads of wood yearly from Braywoods for executing his office.

Other notable local properties include the hunting lodge New Lodge, Oakley Court, Foly John Park (Queen Elizabeth 1 is reputed to have dined here en-route to Reading and Bray Church was fined for not ringing its bells as a mark of loyalty to the Queen), Old Lodge Farm in Coningsby Lane (named after Richard Coningsby), Grove Farm and Yew Tree Cottage all date back to the 15th Century. In 1442 there is mention of a hospital with almshouses in Fifield but its location is unknown. Along Oakley Green Road there is the Old Malt House (originally the 15th Century Nags Head Inn). Kimbers Farm is mentioned in 1288 and Mills Farm with its ancient moat was reputed to be

an Inn for the pack horse travellers. The original Fifield House was first mentioned in 1479 when its owner John Fowler died, the house was not in its present location and was a manor farm. By the 16th century Fifield House was owned by the Norreys family and William Norreys was Keeper at Foly John Park. John Norreys lived in the house, he was knighted by Queen Elizabeth 1, appointed Sheriff of Berkshire and was Usher of the Black Rod at the most Noble Order of the Garter and Controller of the Works at Windsor Castle.

A survey of the Parish of Bray in 1608 accounted for land as follows; Fifield 12 acres, Moneyrow Green 30 acres and Holyport 10 acres.

If you are the owner of one of these 'old' properties in the local area please do let the Editor have further information about your property to add to the local history of the area.

The 30 mph limit, which appeared to be the more straightforward proposal, is still in progress. According to the Police it will take extra measures to make it effective. 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
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9 Wet Spots - where are we now?

"Wet Spot" 1 at the Cricket Club has been OK for some time and has amber status waiting to see what happens.

"Wet Spot" 2 by the speed bump near Longlea has caused trouble in the past and is again. RBWM cleared the ditches in 2014 but since then there has been no maintenance. It doesn't take much to block the narrow and shallow section past the bump. Wet weather is again producing familiar problems. An OGAFCA volunteer has cleared dumped rubble, garden waste, and sandy clay both sides of the speed bump but really the landowner should clear this annually. From past experience that's unlikely. Long term hope lies in asking RBWM to come to the rescue again. Consequently the status of this spot has gone from green in 2014 through amber to red currently.

"Wet Spot" 3 at Braywood Lodge on the Oakley Green Road is also a waiting amber. In 2011 OGAFCA volunteers cleared ditches and RBWM jettied the pipe under the verge. We thought we'd cracked it but in 2014 learned the problem was not resolved.

For many years "Wet Spot" 4 was referred to as the "Coningsby Lane shambles" - but no longer ! Last summer RBWM carried out our proposals, installing a culvert under the Lane and a pipeline northward as a substitute for the ditch that was once there. It took around 17 years to achieve ! A massive volume of water has passed through the new route which would have collected at the junction of the Lane with Fifield Road. It has also provided an exit route for the huge volume of water that collects along the northern boundary of a property north of the Lane. The landowner has now cleared a stretch of ditch to join into the new system but an OGAFCA volunteer will now need to distribute the spoil and debris left carelessly along the footpath. The combined flow is gushing along like a fast stream. It is very pleasing to see a system functioning as predicted. The work left an inviting access to the north but a lockable bollard is now installed. After the years of red status this spot has finally turned GREEN ! There are still times when water collects at the junction backing up from further south. This is a different problem associated with "wet spot" 8.

"Wet Spot" 5, the Oakley Green Road field entrance near Forest Farm, has been green since 2014. Water flowing out of this gateway used to cause road flooding. Streetcare carried out a reduced version of our recommendations and installed 2 extra gullies. This improved things and

there has been no recurrence.

"Wet Spot" 6 is at the junction of Forest Green Road and Coningsby Lane at Ledger Farm. Water coming down off the Drift Road lacks an adequate onward route and inevitably crosses the road. There is no easy solution to this and the best we can hope for is to encourage the landowner to provide more sump area on the south side of the road to delay the flow. This still has red status.

"Wet Spot" 7, south of Stewart Close, regularly filled with water and threatened houses. It affected the largest number of properties and Residents so OGAFCA prioritised it. Streetcare were helpful and launched a study. In October 2014 a new pipe system and gullies were installed. The contractors reported that the ditch towards the polo pitch needed to be cleared or water would back up in the new pipe. The landowner promised to carry out maintenance but this has not been done. This has GREEN status until proved otherwise.

The ditch and car park at the Fifield Inn were considered part of "wet spot" 7 but are now clearly a separate issue caused by the limited capacity of the pipe from the car park entrance north to the same ditch towards the polo pitch. There are more pressing priorities so "wet Spot" 7B remains at red.

"Wet Spot" 8 centres around the culvert south of Coningsby Lane. Water heading north from "Wet Spot" 6 on Forest Green Road arrives at this point to get through the culvert and a restricted route to the Manor Grove culvert where it overflows again. Another benefit of the new Coningsby Lane system is that vast volumes of water are no longer contributing to this. This red status situation is very difficult to resolve and the only hope is to delay as much as possible on the way across country between Forest Green Road and this spot.

Most difficult to find a solution for is "Wet Spot" 9 at the Cardinal Clinic. This really starts on Tarbay Lane with water passing through properties south of Dedworth Road to collect and focus on one spot. If proposed housing for this area goes ahead the developers will have an intriguing problem on their hands !

Superfast Berkshire Broadband programme update



As you are aware from our previous newsletters Gigaclear are working with local authorities across Berkshire and the Superfast Berkshire Broadband programme to build the ultrafast, full fibre infrastructure for Berkshire.

You may have noticed that Gigaclear are currently working on the Drift Road. However, this build is not for our villages sadly, but Winkfield Ref 29 on the above map.

The update on Fifield area is that Fifield North Ref 10 has a build start planned for May / June 2020 and service available around March 2021 and Fifield South Ref 11 has a build start planned for May/June 2020 and service available from end of 2020.

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Garden Centres and Borough Plan

Squires Garden Centre

The Windsor Area Development Management Panel met in November 2019 to consider the revised plans submitted by Bewley Homes and Square Bay (No 5) LLP for 37 dwellings at the Squires Garden Centre site and voted unanimously to refuse the application. The main reasons for refusal were:

- the proposal represented inappropriate development in the Green Belt, and no 'very special circumstances' had been demonstrated that could outweigh the harm to the Green Belt and any other harm
- by reason of its layout, scale, bulk, proximity of the proposed flats at plots 18-26 and 27-37 to Windsor Road and Maidenhead Road and lack of opportunity for landscaping, the proposal would result in a dense pattern of development that would appear overly dominant and cramped within the site and out of keeping with the character of the street scene and wider area. The proposal would not represent good design.

If the Borough Local Plan were to be adopted in its current form site AL22 (the Squires site) would be removed from the Green Belt, so only the density/design considerations would apply.

Aldi store at Wyevale Garden Centre site

It was reported in the local press in December that the discount supermarket chain Aldi had agreed a deal to buy the bulk of the Wyevale garden centre site from Wates who acquired it in 2018 (the centre is currently being run by British Garden Centres). The site is part of the proposed AL21 allocation in the Borough Local Plan and under Wates' plans they still intend to build 450 homes on the rest of the site in addition to the proposed retail store.

The site allocation in the draft Borough Local Plan does not make provision for retail use within the site and this use would not be policy compliant. It is reported that Aldi intends to discuss its plans with RBWM before consulting with the local community and residents should make their views known to local councillors. Such additional development of the AL21 site would compound existing concerns on matters such as traffic congestion and air quality.

Borough Local Plan

The latest Consultation on Proposed Changes to the Borough Local Plan Submission Version ('BLPSV-PC') closed in December and RBWM is currently reviewing all representations made. OGFRA argued that the Borough Local Plan has not been made sound by the changes proposed or additional consultation material provided and that the land allocations AL21 and AL22 should be removed from the Borough Local Plan (OGFRA's submission can be found on our website at www.ogfra.org).

There is no precise timetable going forward but it is anticipated that after reviewing all representations RBWM will make such further changes as required to the BLPSV-PC and submit these to the Inspector (expected Spring 2020). Examination could resume with further Hearings from late Spring 2020 onwards. If the Inspector determines that the BLPSV-PC can be made 'sound' subject to certain changes a further consultation would then take place on the overall changes to the original Submission Version of the Borough Local Plan (known as 'Main Modifications') which could ultimately lead to formal adoption of the Borough Local Plan by RBWM.

It is unlikely that the Borough Local Plan in its current form will be adopted and residents should continue to make their views known to local councillors. For its part OGFRA will be seeking to participate in the Hearings with the Inspector as and when these take place.

Community Safety Update

As we mentioned in our Autumn Newsletter we must all be that bit more vigilant at this time of year as the dark nights make it easier for thieves.

Unfortunately there was a break in at Clevelands Farm on 8 January via Braywood Cricket Club. Thieves took a quad bike and hedge trimmers and the club lost a gate padlock and chain and fencing between Clevelands and the outfield. Also the club outfield was damaged where the thieves pushed the quad bikes across the grass before driving them up the road towards Oakley Green. Braywood Cricket Club has CCTV so the police will have the footage soon and it is hoped that the thieves can be identified.

A long time ago in a county far, far, away, my family moved to a brand new house. We were all very excited by this and made frequent visits to the building site to monitor progress. Although the final development was quite large, they initially finished a row of four houses and we were the second family to move in, beaten by a day by the lovely couple next door.

We returned to the top of the stairs and then into the bathroom where the sound was very loud indeed!

There was a very wide shelf in the bathroom below the mirror to disguise all the pipework. My father fetched a jemmy and wrenched up the shelf. There, sitting on the cistern was a very large tabby cat, very hungry and extremely cross. My brother reached in and lifted the furious moggy out of his prison. For a moment we all wondered what we should do with it, especially as our terrier was already taking an unhealthy interest in proceedings. Then, my mother noticed something through the window.



“Look” she pointed at our new neighbours, out in the garden, obviously searching for something. She leant out,

“Have you lost a cat?” she called, “Yes,” our neighbour called back, “she disappeared just after we arrived. We’ve been searching everywhere”

As we reunited our squatter with her relieved owners, we discovered that she had made a break for it while they were unpacking and had run into our house, where the builders were finishing off the last few bits and pieces. They obviously did not see her and nailed down the shelf with the cat cowering underneath.

As time went by, we got used to the cries at night from owls and foxes, but, thankfully, never again heard the ghostly wailing of a captured cat.

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
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VE Day Afternoon Tea on The Green
